CURRO HERMANUS MINI HOCKEY FESTIVAL




INSECTS!

BOUNCING EGG EXPERIMENT!



The Grade 2s observed the Bouncy Egg Experiment this week. Over two days, they watched the egg transform from a hard shell into a rubbery membrane due to it being soaked in a jar of vinegar. Many of the children predicted that the egg would bounce, attributing it to the vinegar reacting with the eggshell, evident by the formation of bubbles. This chemical reaction dissolved away the hard eggshell. So, when we tested the egg, it bounced numerous times, causing much excitement! However, the highlight was, of course, seeing the end result of a splat egg!











SEQUENCING SKILLS

The little Ladybirds (Grade 000) have been practising their sequencing skills this week. They used different apparatus to make a pattern using two colours. They built patterns with Duplo blocks and uniflex cubes, copied pattern cards with colourful farm animal counters, sequenced two coloured tongue depressor sticks and threaded beads as well. While completing the different sequencing tasks, the children worked in groups, discussing and sharing their patterns with each other.

Sequencing is an important skill that helps children develop their memory skills, and concept of order, which prepares them for number concept work and pre-reading skills.
