Day 5 was an early rising and the camp site and trailers were packed and loaded whilst the Grade 7s prepared themselves for an 18km hike from Theewaterskloof to Eikenhof dam. The hiking route followed parts of the Boland hiking trail and forestry roads in and around the Hottentots Holland Mountains. The site of the Eikenhof dam and its lush surrounds brought renewed energy to the group, and we were privileged to be treated to a spit braai prepared by Mr Rank and Mr Patience that evening.



Day 6 was team activities day, and the groups were faced with different challenges which saw them collect points for their groups. The day culminated with a fun session of stalk the lantern, while watching the almost full moon rise over the mountains.

MATRIC TEA






