
















GRADE 4 OUTING TO VERGELEGEN

This week our Grade 7s had the opportunity to explore MoneyTime, a web-based financial literacy program that makes teaching financial literacy easy. MoneyTime automatically marks quizzes and tests to assess pupils' progress after each lesson. Pupils earn virtual money for completing lessons, which they can



then spend in the game. They can choose to spend, save, invest or donate to charity, and the decisions they make have simulated real life outcomes that help them understand the impact of their choices. This enables the pupils to explore the making of financial decisions without risk, or fear of failure. There are also 13 lessons for them to complete with their parent or guardian. These are completely optional but are highly recommended as they enable pupils to put their learning into their own real-life context. We look forward to this amazing learning opportunity!








NURSERY RHYMES

We were thrilled to have RMC Videographers on site a number of times during the last 2 weeks to capture footage of our school "in action" to use for marketing purposes.









GRADE 3 AFRIKAANS


METAPHOR POEMS


























CLAY CLUB

Clay Club is off to a great start, so we thought we would share some of the benefits of clay play with you (courtesy of @the.creativityproject). Maybe it will inspire you to give it a go yourself!



6 benefits of clay play.

Self-regulation

Clay is soft, pliable, and comforting. It engages the senses and has a soothing quality, helping to relieve stress and regulate emotions.

A range of movements from pinching to pounding is welcome.

Fine motor development

Squeezing, smushing, pinching, and rolling clay strengthens hands and fingers and improves dexterity, crucial for writing and drawing.

Language skills

Open-ended clay experiences spark natural collaboration and storytelling which develops vocabulary and builds language skills in context

Socialization

Clay is malleable and responsive, sparking imaginative, fluid ideas that are inclusive of all children's abilities, languages, and cultures.

Self-expression

Children have the power and agency to transform a lump of clay into anything they wish. Every squish, pinch, and roll becomes a language of expression and a way to share oneself.

Creative confidence

Children feel a sense of power when transforming clay with their hands.

Their confidence and resilience grow when given opportunities to innovate freely and fearlessly.
