
NEWS FROM ALUMNI

The best memory of all was the Founders Day Assembly under the oaks at the Admin buildings, it was so exciting and such a treat to have mom and dad there afterward for tea.

I have always valued my time at Somerset House immensely, after fighting with my parents when I was told I was moving schools, once I joined Somerset House, I literally never looked back. It was simply the best school in the town and for me personally, I thrived, I grew, I felt safe, I learnt and I excelled in sports and in class.

I went on to a public high school, and although most of my friends went to other schools, I was a confident, well-equipped young person who was easily able to integrate with other children and to adapt to a big school way of thinking. I truly believe that the confidence instilled in me as a learner at Somerset House went a long way in preparing me for the big wild world.

I drove past for years with fond memories, and I've held onto my Falcon Badge, my report card file, and school magazines so that I could one day show my children.

We enrolled our eldest son at Oakwood in 2024 in Grade 000 and although it took him a while to settle, he now loves school and has a wonderful group of friends and a genuine fondness for his teacher. He will move on next year, a big step for him, and I just know that the caring hands of the school and the staff as a whole will help him transition through this and many future challenges and that he, too, will have the opportunity to grow to be a confident and well-equipped young man. I hope that the same will be true for my daughter when she gets there, and that is all that a parent can ask for their children entering a very different, big, wild world in years to come.
