SEED GERMINATION AND PLANT GROWTH




BOYS U11 VS BEAUMONT



Executive Functioning Tip!

Executive functioning is a set of skills that help us manage tasks, solve problems, and meet goals. It can be referred to as the "boss of the brain", the part of our cognition that tells us when, how and with what intensity to do things. It's like the director of a play, unseen but responsible for making sure everything runs smoothly.





Review your family's weekly calendar.

- Take just 5 minutes on Sunday to sit down as a family to examine and discuss your family's weekly schedule.
- Discuss any school assignments that need planning or executing.
- Address any materials for school or extra curriculum activities that might need to be purchased.
- Share what aspects of the week everyone is most excited for.

Modelling executive function skills such as planning and future thinking is important to the development of your child's executive function.
